Helping Lima's Children in Huaycan

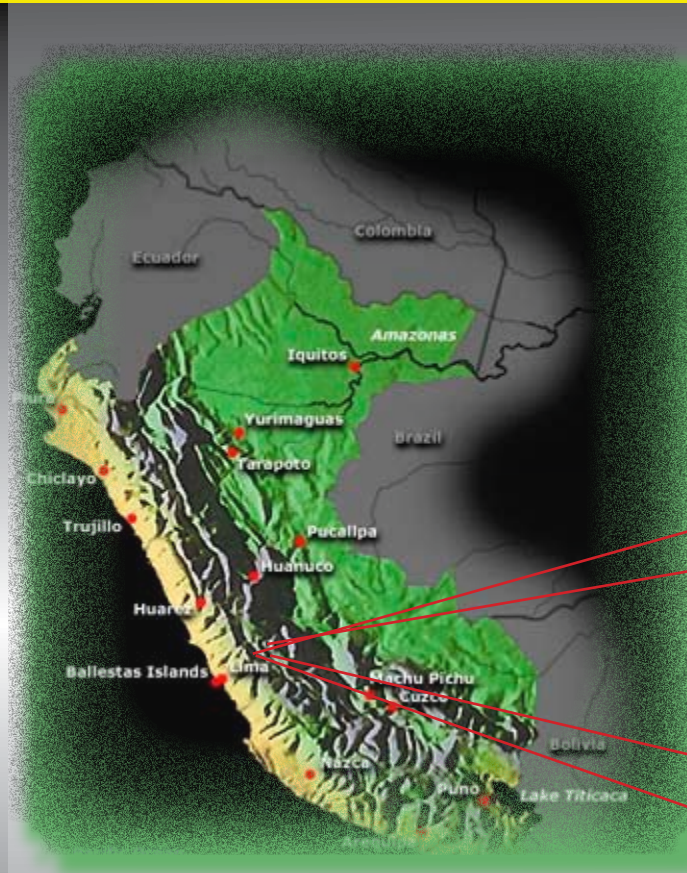
Up to 100 needy children, mainly aged 5 to 12 receive lunch, Christian teaching, and homework help twice a week. Their parents attend monthly training meetings.

Baptism in the Shanty Towns

The gospel has only been clearly preached in Peru during the last hundred years, but has prospered in the last 30 years, especially among the poor. So have the sects. The upper class of Peru is little reached with the gospel, but there is a growing church amongst the middle-class. In spite of growth of the evangelical church amongst the poor, the church remains poorly taught with weak leadership and many problems of immaturity and division. Baptisms in shanty town churches are held on public holidays in the country, when the whole church will enjoy the outing.

Reaching Lima's Families in La Campina

Up to 56 mothers and their children under 6 years of age, come two mornings a week to a local church to receive Christian teaching and practical training in nutrition, health, self-esteem and parenting skills, in conjunction with educational activities for the children. They are served a nutritious lunch.
